Theoretical background

- Mesch and Manor on ethnic relations in 2001: localized social ties?
- Liberated community' not bound to place
- Compression theory: minorities face constrains when they try to participate
- Avoidance theory: minorities pushed to structurally disadvantaged neighborhoods
- Compositional perspective: culture influences neighboring
- Choice-constraint model for housing: ethnic preferences in residential choices



Protest demonstrations and the ethnic grid on the housing problem

- Widespread home ownership among dominant groups (>75% -Mesch&Manor 2006)
- Rising costs of housing as a trigger for social unrest
- Competition for housing and the discourse of belonging
- Symbolism of home
